Fallsers Join DNC Volunteers

Blending patriotism with partisanship, Fallsers and Village members turned out in force to help staff the Democratic National Convention the last week in July.

They were among the thousands of volunteers who made the four-day event run smoothly. For many visitors not accredited to the Convention, volunteers were their only connection to America's quadrennial political rite. More importantly, they were the face of Philadelphia, guides to its history and culture.

EFV member Kathy Donner kept track of the nationwide delegate counts for Utah; Eileen Bazelon took care of Arkansas; Village member Gayle Griffith worked the registration booth at the Convention Center; and Nancy Jean Petro handled hospitality at the Constitution Center.

Solicited months in advance, heralded in the media, vetted by the FBI, and trained in their assigned roles, volunteers in their red, blue, or yellow "Ask Me" t-shirts were everywhere, it seemed, as greeters, guides, tabulators, registration takers, information providers, and friendly mediators.

Their venue was the city itself, not just the official Wells Fargo Center and Convention Center, but the full panoply of Philadelphia's rich cultural and historical heritage.

Some like Nancy Jean Petro donned colonial dress as she greeted visitors in replica models of the Oval Office and Air Force One in the Constitution Center. She described the experience as "very positive for the city."

Others, like Jim Sherman, who's been a Philadelphian since his days at Drexel University, had never been to the Atwater Kent Museum where he was assigned to welcome visitors. In such moments, Sherman, the volunteer, doubled as Sherman, the

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EFV Leads Effort To Restore Mifflin Library

Like 95% of Philadelphia public elementary schools, the Mifflin School did not have a functioning library – until volunteers from the Village stepped in.

Since 2014, EFV volunteers have been reading to children twice a month in the "Read to Me" program. Susan Smith, chair of the Civic Engagement Team, notes that over half of the 4th graders in Philadelphia public schools cannot read on grade level. Simply reading aloud and making books available can help with this serious problem.

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librarian since 2010.

Working with Mifflin staff, Smith and Mary Flournoy, co-chair of EFV's operating group, managed to get the school to reopen the library as a pilot project last spring. They also drew on the experience of volunteers at another school.

As part of the arrangement to reopen, volunteers from the Village signed up to staff the library in the absence of a librarian.

The library opened Monday and Friday mornings for visits from kindergarten through 2nd grade. The 3rd grade came Friday afternoon. A volunteer read to half the class; two or three volunteers checked out books for the other students. Then the groups switched places.

From May 2 – June 10 the library served 131 students - over 41% of the school. Teachers were enthusiastic and contributed to the success of the project by pre-selecting books and helping to get the books returned.

In mid-June, additional volunteers worked to label, stamp, pocket, and shelve over 500 books. A total of 34 volunteers have participated in the Library project so far.

The Engagement Team is planning to open the Library and start "Read to Me" in October – helping students read "on track" and enjoy reading! "You're never too old, Too wacky, too wild, To pick up a book And read to a child." Dr. Seuss

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tourist. "It sometimes seemed we had more volunteers than we needed, but there's no question their interaction with visitors brought credit to the city," said Sherman, president of the local Germantown Cricket Club.

For long time Falls resident Kathy Donner, who worked one level up from the Wells Fargo center floor with the Utah delegation, the overwhelming impression was the diversity of the crowd. "It was so America. It filled me up inside." Donner was a tabulator. Armed with a tablet and three hours training, her job was to keep track of the shifting delegate count which became moot when Hillary Clinton was nominated by acclamation. She said the thousands of cell phones and electronic devices in the Wells Fargo Center interfered with the telemetry and her ability to send and receive signals. Following the first-day protest by Bernie

Sanders supporters, she said excitement grew.

Eileen Bazelon kept count for Hillary Clinton's home state of Arkansas, a job that put her just feet away from platform celebrities like Meryl Streep and Sigourney Weaver. Behind her sat turbaned Sikhs from California. Like Donner, she was "incredibly moved" by the diversity.

The Convention Center was the site of Democratic party caucus and council meetings, most of them of them open to the public. Gayle Griffith worked with DNC staff in registering and ticketing people.

"Wells Fargo was what you saw on television. The Convention Center was where issues got discussed, like Planned Parenthood," said Griffith. "To get on the list (of visitors), a lot of clearance

was required."

It is no surprise that East Falls produced its share of DNC volunteers. The neighborhood is politically active with good voter turnout and strong grass roots organization. Mark Green, leader of the 38th ward which covers East Falls, said many voters in the neighborhood are "self starters."


"You don't need a brass band to get them to the polls," he said.




Ron Chernow's Alexander Hamilton published in 2004, is the inspiration for the multi Tony Awards Winning Broadway Play: Hamilton by Lin-Manuel Miranda.
